Mayors Report

The reports of the attack on Lee Rigby that same afternoon left me numb. I felt the same numbness when I attended my first function, the Mytholmroyd Station Partnership annual luncheon the following morning. Knowing I had to say some words, I was slightly stuck, when all I could say was 'thank you'. The feeling that something so terrible had taken place, that could happen anywhere, yet we have people so freely giving of their time and energy to make our town a cleaner, better, more welcoming place for residents and visitors alike. This theme of just saying thank you seemed to stick with me for the whole of our year, and nothing pleases an audience more, than a short speech!

That said, some of my longer and more nerve wracking talks were with our schools and academy's, while presenting the town council's Kenneth Kaberry awards. Work of the Council

During the last year the full council has met on 17 occasions and made numerous decisions plus considered and made recommendation to Calderdale MBC on 121 planning applications.

Committees

Committees examine issues in detail. Six were appointed this year and the Chairs outline the highlights.

Environment & Allotments

The E&A Committee has worked to improvement the environs of Hebden Royd. The main areas of work were: White Lee Rec: in partnership with Calderdale MBC made changes to the rec and part-funded the improvements. Christmas Lights: the annual installation of the Christmas Lights, the Picture House illuminated for the first time something that received positive feedback and switch-on events in Hebden Bridge and Mytholmroyd. Hanging baskets: increased in number once more making our Township look attractive in the height of summer. Annual Spring Clean: Held in March, attracting a large number of community groups playing a role in the upkeep of the area, the Spring Clean weekend is recognised as a source of income for these groups. Banksfield Allotments: renovation work was completed, with an increased number of plots and improved facilities. High Hirst Allotments: Spring 2014 saw the culmination of several years' work to develop a plot of land at Dodd Naze into High Hirst allotments. There are 41 plots with further opportunities to develop the site. *Cllr Nigel Yorke*

Community Funding

Being Chair of the Community Funding Committee is a real privilege, you can see the community of Hebden Royd growing and developing. The projects are innovative with proposals packed with new ideas that address concerns within the community. Some are about putting into place something that has been omitted from the fabric of life in Hebden Royd, whether it be in the Sports or Arts or other obscure minority interests.

The resourcefulness and energy of people presenting their projects is engaging and eventful as people try to compress their projects into a five minute presentation before a panel of councillors.

Vital social needs are highlighted and without the hard work and of many young people, some festivals such as the Fair for Youth would not be going ahead this year. In this time of economic recession, as councillors we applaud the resilience and determination of people of Hebden Royd to make a difference to our lives. *Cllr James Fearon*

Picture House

The Picture House continues to go from strength to strength with perhaps the most exciting development this year being the introduction of 'live streaming' from some of the most prestigious theatre, ballet and opera companies in the UK. Beginning with 'The Audience' starring Helen Mirren and followed by Kenneth Branagh's Macbeth live from Manchester, David Tennant as Richard II from the RSC and War Horse from the National Theatre they have contributed significantly towards the Picture House showing a small surplus for the year. The improvements programme has continued with refurbishment of the upstairs and disabled toilets and plans to refurbish the kiosk in hand. The Picture House continues to offer a unique blend of 'art', foreign language and mainstream films. Friends of the Picture House must be thanked for their support raising c£1300 across two open days. *Cllr Susan Press*

Staffing Committee

The Staffing Committee looks after over 20 staff employed by the Town Council, including the Hebden Bridge Picture House, a very successful and popular asset for the residents of Hebden Royd and those further afield. The Committee has put in place measures to ensure the smooth running of the enlarged organisation, appointing Employment Law Specialists to support us, recruiting new staff during the year as well as gaining accreditation as a Living Wage Employer, one of the first Town Councils in the country to achieve this. *Cllr Dave Young*

Strategy & Review

This advisory committee looks at policies and procedure and some of the meatier subjects considered and discussed by the Town Council. The committee this year have enjoyed reviewing Standing Orders and Financial Regulations, commented on items of consultation from Central & Local Government and many other bodies. *Cllr Robin Dixon*

Twinning

This twinning committee have been preparing this year for a number of upcoming celebrations, the 60th anniversary of the liberation of St Pol, hosting friends during the Tour de France which passes through Hebden Royd on July the 6th and the immanent 20th and 30th Twinning Anniversaries with Warstein & St Pol respectively. Importantly, the 100 year commemoration of World War 1 has been discussed and a separate working group has been established to plan events to remember this important historical event. *Cllr Christine Davenport*



The Precept, the amount collected by Calderdale MBC on behalf of Hebden Royd Town Council, was £218,795 plus grants of £39,538 This works out at £72.89 per year for a Band D household or £1.40 per week. The majority of dwellings in Hebden Royd are Band A properties.
