Looking at forecasts for energy prices, although they may be slightly lower in terms of cost of usage the standing charges are likely to remain high, affecting the overall costs particularly as the cap has been removed with no evidence it will be re-introduced in the winter months. The government may provide assistance again, but this has not been assured.

Mortgage rates as you know have increased to the highest rates in over 30 years . Furthering the risk of evictions and increased home losses.

These factors seem to indicate that financial hardship and the demographic affected will not follow traditional pathways, and vulnerable groups will extend into working families with mortgages.

The BBC living correspondent reported that bill payers are dipping into savings accounts at a record level in May. This has prompted warnings from charities about the ongoing high cost of living.

Locally, despite warmer weather Calder food support has found the search for food supplementation has not dropped below 50 bags per week.

Many of the bags are collected by different people on a weekly basis, showing that the support is needed to see people through periods of high expense and hardship.

Summer holidays are fast approaching with the concern that many children will not receive free school meals for 6 weeks, stretching family budgets further.

With this in mind I think we should hold a preparatory meeting before the end of July to ensure we can act in a pro active rather than reactive manner when the time comes . Probably before Strategy and Review so the allocated budget can be discussed and voted on at that meeting.
